### Communicate with H.E.A.R.T. training begins

The Wellington Schools have adopted a new customer experience training program called Communicate with H.E.A.R.T. intended to reach all staff, administrators and Board members. Created by the Cleveland Clinic, the training is in two parts: S.T.A.R.T. (<u>S</u>mile, <u>T</u>ell your name and role, <u>A</u>ctive listening,

<u>Rapport and relationship building, Thank</u>) with H.E.A.R.T. and Respond with H.E.A.R.T. <u>Hear</u>, <u>E</u>mpathize, <u>A</u>pologize, <u>T</u>hank.

The goal of the two-hour training conducted by Ron Kisner, previously a trainer in the Cleveland Schools, is to create a welcoming, caring environment where each Wellington parent, guest, student or colleague feels respected and valued.

Kyle Metzger, a first-year Intervention Specialist at Wellington High School completed one of the initial trainings and thought it was valuable in re-enforcing some of the principles she tries always to practice.

"I think the training provides a good guide on how to engage with people and break the ice especially if it seems they are not having a good day," began Kyle who's sunny disposition embodies the first principle of S.T.A.R.T. with H.E.A.R.T. "I find that I can even use this training in interacting with my special needs students."

She also indicated that the training can help resolve apparent conflicts by simply establishing a clear line of communication.

"Once I was having a hard time reaching a parent by telephone only to find out she preferred being contacted by texting—easy fix," conceded Kyle.

Communicate with H.E.A.R.T. lifted the Cleveland Clinic from the bottom of patient experience measures to a leading ranking among the nation's hospitals. The hope is that this training will make the Wellington Schools a District that provides an enviable, gold-standard customer experience to anyone walking through its doors.



The Student Wellness and Success Coordinator's role is to assist the district with identifying and implementing K-12 Social Emotional Learning programming that aligns with the Ohio Department of Education's Social Emotional Learning Standards which provide a continuum of development across five competencies that are as follows: Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, and Responsible Decision-Making. The SEL standards are designed to work alongside ODE's Academic Standards and are part of Ohio's Strategic Plan for Education Each Child, Our Future. The SWSC works alongside the district counselors and social worker in order to research district data and identify and implement SEL programming based on that data across the three tiers of prevention which include Universal for all students in grades K-12, targeted prevention for about 15% of students across the district, and tier three intensive supports for about 5% of students across the our school district.

- **Best piece of advice:** "At the heart of life lie the relationships we have with other people."






