LETTER FROM DR. PELTZ, SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Wellington Families,

Hope is powerful. Hope motivates, encourages perseverance, and reduces negativity. Hope keeps personal dreams and goals alive. Hope is contagious. When you are filled with hope, positivity spills over to everyone you meet. It is impossible to ignore hope. Kids work harder and will take monumental leaps forward if they feel that their teachers believe in them. While some people can use spite to power their efforts, working against someone is tiresome and steals hope. Inversely, everyone gains positive momentum if they feel someone is pulling them forward or cheering them on.

Even if the gain is small, the laws of physics show us that a larger and more powerful force will always change the motion of an object in the direction of the push or pull. Simplifying this all, the more the kids understand that we believe in them, the more they will believe in themselves.

We are reinvesting in the hope-building business. You may have noticed our focused efforts on improving the school culture and climate through our Duke PRIDE programs and student recognitions.

We have also increased our number of short-cycle interventions and checkpoints during Duke Time and WIN Groups to show our kids that they are improving and their efforts are paying off. We are working with our students to set personal goals based on their interests and strengths.

Showing our kids that we care about what makes them special helps to connect what we teach in and out of the classroom to their hopes and dreams. We believe that every moment has the chance to positively impact our kids' lives, and we do not want to let an opportunity slip away where we could build someone up.

While we are good at our jobs, we need your help. Parents and community members can help build hope as quickly as they can erode it. Your kids listen to you. They will buy in even more if they know you trust and believe in the school. If there are obstacles, let us know so we can work on removing them. 




Ohio State Testing ... but WHY? and How Can I Help?





- **#2.** The test evaluates whether students have mastered the skills and knowledge outlined in Ohio's Learning Standards for their grade level.
- **#3.** Results can identify areas of excellence and improvement, allowing for targeted support for administration, staff, and students.
- #4. The test plays a role in determining the graduation requirement pathway.
- #5. Standardized testing provides a way to compare schools and districts across the state.

Some great parenting tips as test time slowly creeps into the classrooms.

Mental & Physical Preparation

- #1. Get Enough Sleep- A well-rested brain performs better.
- #2. Eat a Healthy Breakfast A nutritious meal helps with focus and energy.
- #3. Stay Positive & Encouraging- Help reduce test anxiety by reminding your child effort is more important than perfection.
- #4 Share Relaxation Tips- Deep breathing, stretching, or positive affirmations.
- #5 Avoid Cramming- A light review and relaxation prevent stress.

Test-Taking Strategies

- #1. Time Management Practice completing questions in a time frame.
- #2. Review Multi-Choice Tips- Like eliminating the wrong answers and looking for keywords.
- #3. Encourage Showing Work- Write a graphic organizer to organize your thoughts or solve math problems on scrap paper to help avoid mistakes.

Academic Preparation

- #1. Encourage Reading and Math practice daily
- #2. Use online resources ALEKS & Exact Path (in your child's CLEVER account)






Westwood Library:


