

We have many great things to celebrate already this school year, including our district's improvement on the <u>Ohio Department of Education State Report Card</u>. I am pleased with the steady growth the school district has made these past several years. We have talented students and teachers and together, we are raising our results each year. Thank you for your continued support.

We are also excited about our new Strategic Plan that the Board approved at our last meeting (Sept. 20) and the completion of the expiring Strategic Plan that achieved the goals as outlined in that plan. Goals completed included launching an Advanced Placement (AP) program at Wellington High School, which now offers 13 AP classes, adding career tech classes at McCormick Middle School, and improving literacy skills at Westwood Elementary.

Last month a special ribbon cutting ceremony took place at our stadium for a new turnstile, which now gives the public access to our track. Thank you to THRIVE! Southern Lorain County and the Wellington Women's League, as well as all who contributed to this project. We invite the community to come out and enjoy the new additions to our facility.

Congratulations to Westwood Elementary School for being designated by our State Support Team Region 2 as a recipient of the Ohio PBIS Bronze Award for 2021 - 2022! PBIS stands for Positive Behavior Interventions & Support. Establishing a positive school culture consists of setting up a behavioral management system to reflect a shared vision of common values, beliefs and expectations.

Capital project updates from the treasurer

The Wellington Board of Education recently authorized several capital expenditures for the FY23 school year. The investment in the facilities and instructional technology clearly shows the Board's commitment to upgrading and improving our District. The capital expenditures are as follows:

- 1. West Roofing has been contracted to replace two sections of roof over the Westwood main office and library to address water intrusion in those areas.
- 2. A turnstile was recently installed at the stadium to allow community access for walkers and runners on the track. The barbed wire around the top of the fence at the stadium will also be removed.
- 3. Sections of the Westwood playground set will be replaced. Mulch has been added to the playground at McCormick to provide a proper fall zone for students when they climb and play on the equipment.
- 4. The West and South side of the high school gym outside walls will be tuck-pointed and waterproofed to repair crumbling mortar joints, and to protect the building from water intrusion.
- 5. The high school gym bleachers will be replaced over the summer of 2023 with new bleachers and a system to automatically open and close the seats. This is an answer to fan and employee safety concerns. The gym will receive a fresh coat of paint to brighten up the entire complex.
- 6. New laptop computers will be purchased for the staff at Westwood this year. In addition, six Clear Touch interactive boards will be purchased for Westwood students to increase engagement in the classroom and improve student test scores.
- 7. A pickup truck will be purchased which will be used in combination with our other truck to clear snow and ice from our parking lots and driveways each winter. This will eliminate the need for a vendor to do this work and will allow our maintenance staff to complete this work in a timely manner.

These expenditures and other facility upgrades are meant to improve the educational environment for all students and staff. We know there is more we need to address as we move forward and with the support of the community, we can make Wellington Schools a source of pride for the entire community.

Wellness news from around our district

Wellington has been selected as the rural pilot school district for the Ohio Handle with Care Program (HWC). Ohio Handle With Care is a trauma-informed, cross-systems, collaborative program aimed at ensuring that children who are exposed to adverse events receive appropriate interventions and have opportunities to build resilience through positive relationships with teachers and first responders. Ohio HWC is supported by a partnership between Hopewell Health Centers and the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. Ohio HWC aims to promote safe and supportive schools, homes and communities that protect children, and communities that help traumatized children heal and thrive. Training for staff and first responders will begin in October starting with staff at Westwood Elementary.

On behalf of McCormick Middle School, our district Wellness Coordinator Elizabeth Wolanski, will be applying for the You Belong Grant through the Mental Health, Addiction and Recovery Services (MHARS) Board of Lorain County. If received, the grant will provide a minimum of \$2,000 in funding to support Kindland and SAVE Promise Club activities. The MHARS Board will be awarding up to 14 grants to middle schools across the county.

LifeAct will be providing suicide prevention programming to the 7th and 8th graders on a quarterly basis throughout the school year. LifeAct uses the Signs of Suicide program to educate middle and high school students on how to recognize depression and the warning signs of suicide, and how to access help for themselves and their peers.

Join the Kindland Movement

The Kindland Movement launched in the high school last spring is ready to expand its humane lessons and acts of kindness throughout Wellington. Recently, Mayor Hans Schneider agreed to bring the Village on board pledging to partner with the District on upcoming community events this fall.

Kindland Ambassador Kathleen Dickason spearheaded a Summer of Kindland including a Kindland table at the Back-to-School Bash. Several of the activities were uploaded to the <u>Kindland App</u>. Follow #BeWELLington on social media.

A key initiative this fall is for a staff member, parent, and student to comprise a Kindland champion team at each school. The priority is to bring the Kindland in Schools program into classrooms which offers seven basic grade-level lessons that fold easily into existing lesson plans. Superintendent Weber sees Kindland as a good fit with the district's Communicate with H.E.A.R.T., PBIS, and other antibullying, social-emotional tools. For more information, click <u>here</u>.

Straight from the H.E.A.R.T.

Communicate with H.E.A.R.T., the proven passionate communications program, devised by the Cleveland Clinic, has expanded to the <u>District's website</u> adding to the response poster cards placed on each school's reception desk. A similar poster is in the Superintendent's Office. By tapping on the Safe Healthy Schools tab, a customer (parent, colleague, visitor) satisfaction survey will open. The Web presence is an enhancement to the stand-up poster cards designed to solicit post engagement experiences with school, staff, and colleagues all of whom are encouraged to utilize either the cards or the online survey.

H.E.A.R.T., which stands for Hear, Empathize, Apologize, Respond, Thank, has been used by the Cleveland Clinic since 2008 as a tool for establishing caring communication among patients and colleagues.

This year, as H.E.A.R.T. training continues for new district employees and those who might have missed last year's sessions, staff will be rewarded for demonstrating the engagement portal, S.T.A.R.T. with Heart, or the service recovery model, Respond with H.E.A.R.T., principles.

The feedback methods are designed to create a baseline for measuring how successfully Wellington is moving toward becoming a District that presents a memorable customer experience. The response mechanisms are not just to track what might go wrong, but to also document praiseworthy interactions.

Similarly, Superintendent Weber would like the program to be one of the principle ways the District becomes a center of empathy and value elevating Wellington's classroom and workforce experiences.
