

The officers collaborate with school administrators to develop and implement safety plans, conduct investigations related to school incidents, and educate students are various safety issues. Safety issues can include alcohol and drug prevention and antibullying efforts. They may also be involved in resolving conflicts and mediating disputes. We have four security officers in the district who serve all three buildings.

### **Kindland Chain at Westwood**

Amid a group of gleeful kindergarteners and first graders, high school Senior Nadia Greer, the newly designated Kindland Ambassador, helped direct the completion of a "Kindness Chain" replete with an array of acts of kind expressions.

The activity was spearheaded by Jordan Burns (Social Emotional Learning and Mental Health Specialist) Dr. Kubasak (Westwood Principal), Miss Greer and Westwood staff.



Mrs. Burns solicited individual interpretations of kindness. One by one the little ones began expressing their amazingly grown up views of kindness such as: "I want to help my mom make cookies," "I want to pick up someone who falls," "Be nice to people," "Cheer up someone who's sad," and so on. Each expression was written on pre-cut strips of colored paper, stapled in a circle and linked together to form the extensive chain hoisted across Westwood's hallway wall.

Mrs. Burns has utilized one of Kindland's lessons in her social skills classes and wanted to do a Kindland activity before the winter break. Kindland Ambassador Miss Greer was more than willing to accommodate. A Kindland "Kindness" essay contest winner, Miss Greer presented the kindness chain activity to the young charges. She delivered a message with universal implications: "When you do acts of kindness and share them, it creates a ripple effect that creates a kinder community."
