# **NOVEMBER ELECTION**

#### LETTER FROM EDWARD WEBER, SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Wellington families,

On November 7, Wellington schools will be on the ballot for Issue 19 for an emergency renewal levy.

When voting on a levy, voters need to know how the funds are used. Funds from the levy help to support and maintain our current level of programming. This covers the daily operating expenses of the Wellington Schools, including educational programs, utilities, transportation, technology, textbooks, building and grounds maintenance, staff, and classroom expenses. The district aims to provide excellent educational programming for all students.

What is the history of our district in maintaining a balanced and strong budget? The district has taken steps to contain costs over the years through conservative spending and budgeting practices. This includes renegotiating contracts with vendors, reducing energy costs, and reviewing staff positions for potential reductions in collaboration with the union membership.

In terms of maintaining and improving our services and facilities, we have invested in improving safety on playgrounds, received safety grants to enhance security in buildings, and made updates to facilities such as the High School gym, roof repairs, parking lots, and classroom technology upgrades. New course offerings have also been added to provide enhanced learning opportunities.

# MR. WEBER'S LETTER



We have had a total of three renewal levies in our history. All of these levies passed with very strong support from the community. The current issue was originally approved in 2011 and has been renewed in 2014. That history of approval and renewal demonstrates the community's support and understanding of the importance of this vital revenue source. This levy is no new money, it is a renewal.

Our treasurer Mr. Donnelly, members from our Board and I have been attending local meetings to be available for questions regarding this important levy. We believe a strong foundation of any community is a strong school district creating opportunities for our future, our children.

### TREASURER'S OFFICE UPDATE

#### Five-year forecast indicates challenges to meet head-on!

The fall 2023 Five-Year Forecast was approved by the School Board on October 17, 2023.

A review of the document will show many sharp variances from previous forecasts including a projected revenue shortfall of almost \$400,000 this year. However, if we take a look at what is behind the numbers we will find out that we may be in a pretty good spot.

The property tax revenue shows a dramatic decline starting next year, however that is due to the state law not allowing the Treasurer to predict the passage of a levy. With the potential passage of the renewal levy, this line item would increase back to the level it is currently at for FY24. The state revenue will not increase significantly over the next few years, however at least the state is holding us at the same level we have been at for the past couple of years without a decrease.

The income tax revenue appears to flatten out for the next few years, however with a strong job market this may increase very soon. Finally, under Other Revenue, there are some possible increases that are difficult to predict as the reimbursements for services and interest rates are very volatile. These factors combined with a conservative approach to predicting revenues means that we "COULD" be better off, we just have to wait and see.

The expenses show several increases that may seem out of line when compared to previous years. However, FY24 is the first fiscal year in the past 5 years where we do not have a large grant (ESSER, SQIG, Expanding Opportunities) to offset some significant costs so the general fund will bear the burden of all operational costs.

Something else to keep in mind is that the forecasted numbers are budgeted dollars. These budget amounts include known costs and some "possible" costs so we are prepared for a few surprises. This method of forecasting allows us to adjust during the year without causing budget overruns.

Just to be clear, we all have to be fiscally responsible to the taxpayer and must be reasonable with requests for expenditures. The levy renewal is not a new source of funding; it simply keeps us stable. We could still have a large revenue shortfall, but if we work together and prioritize "needs" over "wants", we should be just fine this year.

## H.E.A.R.T./Kindland/PBIS Connect

Wellington is moving towards connecting the language of "Communicate with H.E.A.R.T" and Kindland into the District's Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) and Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) portals.

Through the school's district-wide "Kind of a Committee" group that meets at McCormick, H.E.A.R.T and Kindland are in the process of being included into classrooms and utilized during students' Duke time.

Superintendent Mr. Weber wants elements of H.E.A.R.T., originally geared toward staff and the principles of Kindland to be available to students. At a recent SEL meeting, members were reintroduced to a flyer split between key words and practices of H.E.A.R.T. and Kindland.

The Kindland half included words such as: empathy, care, helping ,thoughtfulness, and compassion. The other side of the flyer contained H.E.A.R.T practices of smile, active listening, rapport, relationship building, using preferred names, empathize, apologize and thank.

The committee agreed that both H.E.A.R.T. and Kindland were good fits with the district effort to create a culture of kindness, value, and respect. Gradually, the essence of H.E.A.R.T. and Kindland will find their way into the McCormick's PBIS newsletter and elsewhere.

Two examples of this blending plan are how McCormick tied Kindland into its Halloween treat bag activity, and the middle school's H.I.K.E. (Helping Include Kids Everywhere) commitment to be the school's Kindland lead.





# Students Found "Challenge" Fun


"I did the challenge because it was fun, "said Lincoln, a Westwood second grader. "The library part was the most fun. There were great books and lots of crafts."

# WESTWOOD UPDATES



### Congratulations Westwood!

Westwood was Awarded the SILVER level of distinction for the 2022-2023 school year.

Ohio's Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) Recognition System provides an opportunity to celebrate schools and districts.

Each year, the Ohio Department of Education and the PBIS Network recognize schools and districts for their quality and fidelity of PBIS implementation. Schools are eligible to receive awards at the bronze, silver or gold levels of distinction.

In 2022, a total of 375 schools and districts received recognition across Ohio. Award recipients include 41 gold awards, 80 silver awards, 238 bronze awards and 16 district awards.

What is PBIS? PBIS stands for Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports. House Bill 318 strengthens existing requirements for school districts to implement PBIS. PBIS is a research-based framework for teaching and supporting positive behaviors for ALL students.

This school-wide approach to discipline focuses on building a safe, positive environment where all students can learn. Therefore, students are taught the behaviors we expect to see, reminded to use them, and acknowledged when they do use the appropriate behavior.

#### Attendance WINNING Classroom:

Attending school daily is an easy way to promote future success. This award is received when the classroom spells the word PRIDE on the board. Each day the class has perfect attendance OR only 1 absent student OR only 1 late student, they receive a letter (P.R.I.D.E.). As a class, they work together to spell the word PRIDE.




