LETTER FROM DR. PELTZ, SUPERINTENDENT

Dear Wellington Families,

We all have hopes and dreams for our children. We want them to feel loved, be filled with joy, and find success along the way. By the time they leave childhood, we want them to know that they have strong roots to weather any storm and wings to take them to become the young adults they have envisioned for themselves. Wellington Exempted Village Schools (WEVS) want to partner with our families to make this a reality.

Our staff have come together to reform our district vision statement to reflect this commitment to helping our children reach the futures they want and have the skills they need to face life's challenges.

WEVS understands that we must change how we serve our students so that we can help open doors and introduce opportunities to make this a reality.

At our recent sixth through eleventh Grades Curriculum and Vision Night, we shared our new commitment to redesigning teaching and learning to adapt to a changing educational landscape.

Graduation is not our goal; instead, it is to ensure our students leave WEVS prepared to be happy and successful on their chosen path.

Over the next few years, we will continue to partner with the Lorain County JVS and the Lorain County Community College to provide specialized programs and dual credit courses to our students, but we will also work to get more of those classes within our buildings.

We have aligned our bell schedules between the high school and middle school to accommodate wider flexibility of our course offerings so that we can allow a broader range of students to take classes at their rigor level and provide the support they need.

Instead of focusing on skills that our students struggle with, we will help them identify their strengths and give them chances to build on them. I do not expect all kids to leave WHS knowing precisely what they want to do with their lives, but I do expect that all students will graduate with the skills they need and the confidence to take the next steps. We are our students' teachers, advocates, and life coaches, and the process begins as soon as they enter our buildings and continues after they leave us.



Fall in Love with Reading: Why do we LOVE our reading curriculum?





K-5 Open Court Reading



- 1. Phonics-Based Approach: It emphasizes phonics, which is one of the most effective methods for teaching reading. This allows children to learn the relationship between letters and sounds, making it easier for them to decode words.
- 2. Structured and Sequential: The program provides a clear, step-by-step structure that builds on previously learned skills. It's designed to ensure that children progress in a way that makes sense and doesn't overwhelm them.
- 3. Comprehensive: Open Court covers all aspects of reading, including phonics, fluency, comprehension, vocabulary, and spelling. This holistic approach helps students become wellrounded readers.
- 4. Engaging Materials: The program often incorporates fun, age-appropriate stories and visuals to keep children engaged. It mixes both traditional literature and more contemporary texts, keeping things interesting for young learners.
- 5. Research-Backed: Open Court Reading is grounded in research on how children learn to read. Many educators and researchers advocate for its evidence-based methods.

- 1. <u>Rich and Diverse Texts:</u> The program includes a wide variety of texts—classic literature, modern works, nonfiction, poetry, and more. This diversity helps students explore different perspectives, cultures, and genres, which enhances their critical thinking and cultural awareness.
- 2. <u>Skill Development:</u> It focuses on building essential reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills in a scaffolded way. The program aligns with college and career readiness standards, ensuring students are prepared for the next stage in their academic journey.
- 3. <u>Engaging Themes:</u> Each unit is organized around a central theme or essential question (e.g., "What drives people to explore the unknown?"). This encourages deeper connections between texts and gives students meaningful discussion and personal reflection opportunities.
- 4. <u>Personalized Learning:</u> The platform uses adaptive technology and tools that let teachers tailor lessons to meet students' needs, whether they require more support or advanced challenges.
- 5. <u>Writing and Grammar Support:</u> HMH Into Literature includes extensive writing practice, from argumentative essays to creative pieces, with built-in grammar and style lessons to refine students' skills.
- 6. <u>Focus on Critical Thinking:</u> The program emphasizes analyzing text structure, author's purpose, and rhetorical strategies, fostering a deeper understanding of complex materials.
- 7. <u>Collaborative Activities:</u> Students are encouraged to engage in group projects, Socratic seminars, and peer reviews, making the learning experience interactive and social.





TREASURER'S OFFICE UPDATE

A MESSAGE FROM MR. BAILEY

It is hard to believe we have already made it halfway through the school year! It is that time of year to begin working on the next 5-year forecast for May as we continue to get a clearer picture of the district expenditures and revenues.

Lorain County went through their reappraisal triennial update along with several other Northeast Ohio counties. The property reappraisals have influenced property values and property taxes in Wellington as well as other communities across northeast Ohio.

The increase in reappraisal values and the 20-mill floor have resulted in the district receiving some increased property tax revenue. The increased revenue will help the district reduce the deficit spending amount that we were projecting for this fiscal year and subsequent years.

Local Produce Highlight: Fresh, Healthy, & Homegrown!






