It might be summer break for our students and staff, but the Treasurer's Office is getting ready for their busiest time of the year. We have to wrap up the financial activity for the current year and setup the accounts and budgets for fiscal year 2024.


The Board of Education (BOE) recently approved the district's Five-Year-Forecast. This document shows some increases in revenues over the next few years, as well as increases in payroll and benefits due to negotiated raises and healthcare costs increases. This means our budget will be much tighter over the next few years and discretionary spending will have to be monitored very closely to ensure we are being fiscally responsible to the community.

Another item to be approved this month is the resolution of necessity to approve placing the renewal of the 10-year emergency levy on the November 2023 ballot. These funds are vital to Wellington EVSD's operations meeting our long-term goals.

We are also busy planning for summer facility projects and making sure the custodial staff and maintenance staff have the needed items to address all summer projects before we close our books for the fiscal year. We have about a 10-week window to clean, fix, and repair all items throughout the district as we prepare for the next school year. The WHS gymnasium renovation project is in full swing and we can't wait for students/staff and the community to see the new space.

We wish everyone a happy and safe summer and the Treasurer's office would like to say "Congratulations to the Class of 2023!"

Colleague-to-colleague support valuable

An aspect of Communicate with H.E.A.R.T. that is often overlooked is the component that stresses valuing fellow co-workers. The compassionate communications tool that paces Wellington's customer service performance, offers protocols for staff to provide visitors, and students, but a key component of the training is that of valuing fellow colleagues. Research has shown that colleague-to-colleague value in the workplace leads to higher job satisfaction.

This school year, Nathan Morris, McCormick's dean of students; and Claire Frantz, WHS counselor, were the first two staff members to win H.E.A.R.T. awards based on highly favorable parent comments on the district's online H.E.A.R.T. customer satisfaction survey.

While parents are encouraged to continue using the survey, the next goal is to encourage staff members to use the survey to record exceptional service among fellow colleagues. To assist in that effort, a flier specifically aimed at staff responses, was designed. The flier includes a QR code that when scanned takes the user directly to the H.E.A.R.T. survey. The fliers will be placed in teacher's lounges and other common areas at each school.


News from Nutrition Services

Thank you for eating breakfast and lunch with us this school year! We've enjoyed seeing your smiling faces each and every day.

If your child has a negative meal balance, please be sure to send payment to the Nutrition Services Department. We encourage use of our online payment system, Payschools Central, but we also accept cash or check made out to Wellington Schools Nutrition Services. All positive balances will remain on the account and be rolled over into next school year.

Please note, if greater than \$5 remains on the account of a graduating senior, or student leaving the district, that balance will be transferred to a sibling. If there are no siblings, the funds can be donated to unpaid meal debt or refunded upon request. We are only able to issue a refund if all outstanding student fees are paid in full. Did you know that if your family qualifies for free or reduced-price lunch that you also qualify for a waiver of your school fees? A new application is required each year. Be sure to fill yours out for next school year starting July 1. Applications can be found online using your PaySchools Central account or picked up from the Board of Education. After July 1, applications can be submitted anytime for qualification during the 2023-2024 school year.



Summer of kindness planned for Dukes

We hope you are having a great start to Summer Break! Duke pride will be in full force this summer when students from Westwood and McCormick join Kindland and the Herrick Memorial Library in a Summer of Kindness reading and activities challenge.

At last year's Back-to-School Bash, Kindland Wellington learned that this summer the State Library of Ohio was selecting "Kindness" as its 2023 summer reading theme for students from birth to grade 5. This launched a series of meetings among the various partners to determine how a mutually beneficial summer collaborative could be formed.

Last year, Cleveland-based Kindland put on a Summer of Kindness Challenge on a flier designed like a monopoly board. Each block on the board contained an activity participants were to complete during the summer. At the end of summer, a drawing was held to award an array of prizes. Because of the great partnership Wellington Village Exempted Schools has with Kindland, the broader organization offered to customize a Summer of Kindness Challenge board specifically for Westwood and McCormick. The Herrick Library chose "All Together" as its specific theme, which was a natural tie-in to Kindland's summer direction.

The combined Wellington Village board includes such things as "Support a Local Business", "Gather old toys/and or books to donate to others," or "Check out and read a book on Kindness at Herrick Memorial Library" among other kind-centered gestures and activities. The two-sided board (included in this newsletter) reflects input from Dr. Janet Kubasak, Westwood principal; Nathan Morris, McCormick Dean of Students; Janet Frye, Herrick's Director of Children's Reading; Amy Sword, district communications coordinator; and Kindland's Amanda Guarnieri. The flipside of the Board reflects Herrick's summer hours and events that begin on June 1 with a sidewalk chalk activity; and a reading list recommended by Mr. Morris.

Westwood and McCormick students were issued "smiley face" dots that are to be placed in each activity box to signify completion. Students will deposit their "Challenge Boards" in a special Kindland box at the Back-to-School Bash Aug. 12, and at the Herrick Memorial Library. Prizes will be awarded at the library and by the Wellington schools participants who will also be eligible for Kindland prizes such as Browns and CAVS tickets, and grocery gift cards.

In other Kindland news...The organization recently interviewed Superintendent Edward Weber regarding Kindland Wellington that will be aired in a video/slide show at the Kindland organization's annual awards banquet this month at Landerhaven in Mayfield Heights.





GOAL

Communication (Internal & External)



Develop clear expectations for all forms of internal staff communications so that each building level/department receives consistent and timely updates; ensure all staff members are knowledgeable and informed regarding important district information so that they can confidently act as stewards of the district's vision and decisions and avoid selective pockets and siloed information.



Create two-way communication processes that allow the certified and classified staff to interact with the district administration.
