

How to Add Money to Student Breakfast/Lunch Accounts:

We encourage all parents to utilize our online payment system, PaySchools Central.

Cash and check payments are also accepted at school. For cash payment, students should have money in an envelope with the student's name written on it. Lunch money should be turned in to the teacher or given to the cashier.

Checks can be made out to Wellington Schools Nutrition Services Department. Please note, to keep lines moving, we do not give change back during service. Any surplus money will be added to a student's account for future purchases. If your student requires change back for a special circumstance, please send a signed note with cash payment.



Notification of the Medicaid Pilot Program for Free and Reduced Price Meals

Ohio is one of the fourteen states selected by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to participate in the Direct Certification with Medicaid Demonstration Project. This means, during the 2023-2024 school year, all households that receive Medicaid, and fall within income eligibility guidelines, will automatically qualify for free or reduced-price meals for their school aged-children.

If your household currently qualifies for Medicaid, you will NOT need to complete a free and reduced-price meal application. You will be receiving a letter in the mail by the end of September, indicating your child(ren)'s meal status.

TREASURER'S OFFICE UPDATE A MESSAGE FROM MR. DONNELLY

Welcome Back Staff and Students!

It seems as though the summer break just started a few weeks ago. Actually, it was almost 12 weeks ago, but they have flown by very quickly. During that time our custodial and maintenance staff members have been working hard to ensure the buildings are clean and ready for a new school year. Just about every piece of furniture has been taken out of each classroom and thoroughly wiped down and cleaned. Likewise, all classrooms have been deep cleaned to ensure all students have the best learning environment we can offer.

They have also been working on a wide variety of tasks that just could not be managed during the school year. They have painted several walls, waxed almost every floor, inspected all of the safety equipment, and made repairs to plumbing, lighting, and other areas that required a little TLC.

The Treasurer's office has closed the books on Fiscal 2023 and we are all set for a new and exciting year. We look forward to working with each and every one of our staff to ensure a great year for all of our students.

Please do not hesitate to reach out to our office with any question. We are here to assist you.



WELLINGTON TEEMING WITH KINDNESS



Wellington's new school year opened on a wave of kindness. Two students wrote an award-winning Kindland-sponsored essay and poem envisioning a Kindland school community.

Each Kindland winner received \$1,000 from the Cleveland-based organization, an outgrowth of Stuart Muszynksi's Values-in-Action Foundation. Kindland promotes acts of kindness in schools, businesses, and communities across Northeast Ohio.

In her essay, senior Nadia suggests showing more kindness in schools and elsewhere by employing the Golden Rule, and smiling more, before revealing, "There were two girls at my high school being bullied, and I wrote each of them a one-page letter telling them never to change and to keep being themselves because I liked the difference they bring to our high school." She concluded her essay writing, "We as human beings need to realize that something HAS to change before things get progressively worse."

In her Kindland poem, Madelyn, a freshman, expressed herself in rhyming paragraphs such as "In Kindland we respect each other's views, and never judge or criticize its truth. We learn from different cultures and beliefs and find common ground that brings relief." Her closing lines invite the reader to "come to Kindland, and you will find a place where love and kindness intertwine."

Several students in kindergarten to sixth grade participated in Kindland's Summer of Kindness Challenge. The challenge had students complete twenty one acts of kindness etched on a sheet resembling a Monopoly Board, with a suggested summer reading list on the back.

Westwood and McCormick collaborated with Kindland and the Herrick Memorial Library to sponsor the summer-long challenge. Participants received Kindland t-shirts and other swag, and their completed boards were entered into the Kindland organization's drawing for additional prizes.

Students who took the Summer of Kindness Challenge placed smiley face stickers on blocks of completed kindness challenges. Examples of challenges including helping to bring in the groceries, holding the door open for someone, doing a chore without being asked, or visiting an event at the Herrick Library.

H.E.A.R.T. UPDATE



H.E.A.R.T. Spreads to the Village

Communicate with H.E.A.R.T., the district's customer experience platform, is gearing up for the new school year with plans to complete an online refresher for those who participated in the initial training sessions two years ago.

The goal is to adopt the H.E.A.R.T. principles into the district's Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) initiative. An additional direction is moving H.E.A.R.T. to targeted locations in the Village of Wellington as a community service. Discussions are underway to train managers and employees at the BP Station on South Main St., and its adjoining Taco Bell restaurant.

Initial training was completed in August with plans to accommodate rotating schedules by training small groups of employees on alternating mornings. The program is an evidence-based compassionate communications training devised by the Cleveland Clinic to improve its patient experience. Last school year, the first H.E.A.R.T. awards were presented to WHS guidance counselor Claire Frantz and MMS Dean of Climate and Culture, Nathan Morris. Parents expressed their positive experiences with Mrs. Frantz and Mr. Morris by completing the H.E.A.R.T. survey on the school's website.

Early in the new school year, H.E.A.R.T. Awards will be presented to a pair of employees recognized by fellow colleagues for demonstrating either the S.T.A.R.T. with H.E.A.R.T. engagement practice, or the service recovery Respond with H.E.A.R.T. behavior.



WELLNESS NEWS FROM AROUND THE DISTRICT

Wellington Continues to be the rural pilot school district for the Ohio Handle with Care Program (HWC) for the 2023-2024 school year. Ohio Handle With Care is a trauma-informed, cross-systems, collaborative program aimed at ensuring that children who are exposed to



adverse events receive appropriate interventions and have opportunities to build resilience through positive relationships with teachers and first responders. Ohio HWC aims to promote safe and supportive schools, homes and communities that protect children, and communities that help traumatized children heal and thrive.

Applewood Centers will be offering School-Based Counseling services district wide for this school year. We are extremely excited to welcome Meg Tycast who will be in the district full time servicing students and families. Westwood students will start the year off with weekly social emotional learning lessons through the Second Step curriculum. Lessons focus on topics such as goal-setting, emotion management, empathy and kindness and problem-solving. Students in need of more support have the opportunity to engage in one-on-one skill building, social skills groups, self-management, classroom support. Westwood students will be engaging in classroom PBIS lessons throughout the year. PBIS is a research-based framework for teaching and supporting positive behaviors for ALL students. The school-wide approach to discipline focuses on building a safe, positive environment where all students can learn. Therefore, students are taught the behaviors we expect to see, reminded to use them, and acknowledged when used.

Westwood students have the opportunity to be rewarded with PRIDE tickets and praised for excellent behavior and the ability to follow our school expectations. A monthly reward assembly will be held to recognize both the class and grade level that have earned the most PRIDE tickets. Students also receive "RED" PRIDE tickets individually, which can earn them a chance to get their name called on the morning announcements and a prize from the PBIS prize box. Westwood has been recognized with a Bronze Award by the Ohio PBIS network and the State Support Team for implementation of school-wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports.

McCormick Middle School kicked off the year with a PBIS assembly on the first day of school. Kids met in the Lindley Center to learn about PBIS and our Duke pride matrix. Students did classroom lessons of Pride during the first few weeks of school to highlight expectations during the school year. McCormick Middle School will continue to use validation cards to highlight positive behaviors around the school and give students the opportunity to receive prizes in weekly and monthly drawings.
